Abstract: Visual Quality Preservation

Digitization, digital management and delivery provide a wealth of benefits, but how can visual quality be assured and maintained? BAFTA Archive Research is a business unit within BAFTA (British Academy of Film and Television Arts), combining scientific research with technology innovations supporting the digital needs of moving image archives, producers and service providers. During this presentation and workshop, research results from our VQ-INDEX project will be presented, and quality considerations for digitization, media management and media delivery will be discussed. VQ-INDEX aims to produce visual quality metrics, enabling any content owner to ensure visual quality is maintained throughout the lifecycle. This can result in significant improvements in media encoding, delivery platform performance, and long term digital management. This will be a combined presentation and workshop, providing opportunities for attendees to experiment directly.
